THE POWER OF POSITIVE TALK: WHY SPEAKING WELL OF LEARNING MATTERS

As parents, words have a profound impact, shaping children's perspectives, influencing their attitudes, and playing a significant role in their success. One crucial area where this influence is evident is in how we discuss school and learning. By speaking positively about school and learning, we not only cultivate a positive attitude towards education but also inspire our children to approach learning with enthusiasm.

Building a Positive Attitude: Children are incredibly perceptive and tend to reflect the attitudes they encounter at home. Positive discussions about school create an atmosphere of optimism and excitement, helping children see school as a place for growth and exploration rather than a mere obligation. Encouraging positive school-related conversations can motivate children to actively engage in their education.

Enhancing Academic Performance: Studies consistently demonstrate that a positive mindset correlates with improved academic performance. When parents express confidence in the school's educational quality, speak positively about teachers, and show trust in the learning environment, children are more motivated, exhibit better classroom behaviour, and are eager to participate in learning activities and challenges.

Strengthening Resilience: School can present challenges for children, from academic struggles to social conflicts. Positive parental communication equips children with the resilience needed to overcome obstacles. Emphasising perseverance, acknowledging small victories, and viewing mistakes as opportunities for growth fosters a growth mindset. This mindset empowers children to face challenges confidently and persistently.

Fostering Stronger Relationships: Positive discussions about school help forge stronger relationships between parents, children, and educators, fostering a sense of community and collaboration. When children witness their parents engaging positively with teachers and actively participating in the school community, they feel a sense of belonging and support. This community spirit enriches their school experience and nurtures their social and emotional development.

Setting an Example: By speaking positively about school, parents exemplify respect and appreciation for education. Valuing learning in both words and actions demonstrates to children the importance of education as a lifelong journey. This parental example inspires children to adopt similar values, impacting their lives positively in the long run.

INFRASTRUCTURE & FACILITIES UPDATE

Mrs. Hughes, our Business Manager, and I have collaborated with the Infrastructure team over the past year to secure funding for enhancing school facilities. By the upcoming holidays, we aim to have some painting projects finished, or shortly thereafter. You may have already seen the fencing around the front retaining wall. Engineers have assessed the best approach to reinforce its structure due to weather and student activities. While we do not have a specific completion date yet, this work is scheduled to be finished by year-end. Exciting updates are on the way for our MPC! In the September break, we plan to revamp the MPC with a new blue, safe sports flooring, including markings for a half basketball court near the roller doors.

Get ready for a brand new projector at our next assembly! It has been set up and will be showcased soon, along with a new mobile PA system for Sports Day to ensure Mrs. Menzies' voice is heard clearly. A big thank you to our P&C for helping cover half the cost of the PA system. Furthermore, we have successfully secured funding to replace all the toilet roll dispensers in the school with upgraded ones that will be more user-friendly for everyone. From Mrs Menzies

At St Bernard State School, we have implemented PLD as our reading teaching method for many years. PLD is an evidencebased Australian resource designed to assist teachers in teaching reading effectively. Following the Science of Reading principles, PLD's approach spans from early primary to upper primary years and is applied throughout our school. The methodology of PLD draws from speech pathology, occupational therapy, and education.

Learning to read is transformative, as reading and writing are integral to almost all aspects of society. In Queensland state schools, students are taught the fundamental reading components (word reading and language comprehension) sequentially across all subjects and grade levels, in line with the Australian Curriculum. In October 2023, Queensland introduced a Reading Commitment Statement to ensure consistent reading instruction statewide using the Science of Reading. This validates the effectiveness and efficiency of the approach utilised at St Bernard State School for teaching all students to read. Updates to the Australian Curriculum closely reflect current reading research, acknowledging the exemplary job our teachers do in teaching reading and offering us a chance to continually review and enhance our methods. Below, you will find information for families to assist students in reading at home, directly aligning with our approach at St Bernard State School.

What are decodable texts?

When children first learn to read using systematic synthetic phonics, they are taught letter-sound correspondences in a specific order. They will learn a few at a time – not all at once – and they will practise the letters and sounds they have learned by reading and spelling.

Decodable texts are used with beginning readers and are written to match children's developing letter-sound knowledge. These texts provide an opportunity for your child to practise their reading skills in a meaningful way without having to guess words.

Your child may bring home decodable texts to practise their word reading skills. The texts will contain only those lettersound correspondences they have been taught. If your child is having difficulty decoding a word, model saying the sound represented by each letter and blending the sounds to read the word. For example: for the word 'cat', point to each letter and provide the sound it represents /c//a//t/, then blend the sounds to read 'cat'.

Decodable texts may also contain some high-frequency words that your child has been taught. High-frequency words are words that are common in English texts (for example: said, the, of, is). These words are included in decodable texts to create meaningful sentences. They may contain some letter-sound correspondences that have not yet been taught. How can I help?

- As your child reads, you may notice there are words they can read automatically, while other words will need to be 'sounded out'. When your child comes to a word they do not automatically know, you can help them by saying: 'Say the sounds as you point to the letters. Now, blend the sounds and read the word.' For example: for the word 'hen', point to the letters and provide the sounds, /h/ /e/ /n/, then blend the sounds to read 'hen'.
- If your child still has difficulty reading the word, it's okay to tell them what the word is. Remember, they are still learning about letters and sounds and may need more practise and support.
- When your child is learning new letter-sound correspondences, they may read slowly, and it may look laborious. This is typical of beginning readers and is no cause for concern.
- Remember, practise is key to becoming a skilled reader. Encourage your child to read their decodable texts often and to other family members.

COMPLIMENTS, CONCERNS AND QUESTIONS PROCESS

This coming Friday we have the final approval meeting with the P&C for the compliments, concerns and questions process. The process follows all Department of Education policies regarding communication protocols and feedback processes for schools, while allowing all members of our school community, including staff, to be spoken to in a respectful manner.

St Bernard State School appreciates and acknowledges that parents, carers, students, and community members have a right to complement our school, bring up concerns respectfully and ask questions. The Department of Education, welcome opportunities to improve our services and achieve our vision of equity and excellence in a high performing education system. The process outlines how St Bernard State School will manage these compliments, concerns, and questions.

Once the document has been approved, it will be emailed to all members of our community through the weekly teacher emails and be added to our school website.

Does your child feel overly fearful, anxious, or worried in certain situations?

Many children can feel anxious, fearful, or worried in certain situations. In most situations this is a normal emotion when faced with something threatening. Everyone can feel anxious from time to time. However, some children experience anxiety more intensely or more often than others and it stops them from having fun, going to school, or getting the most out of their life.

Take Action is an evidence-based program for 7- to 12-year-olds experiencing anxiety. Each child session takes approximately 1 hour, and the program runs over 10-12 weeks (either in-person or online). The program also includes six x 1-hour sessions for parents/carers to provide additional education and support on managing children's anxiety.

All children receive a comprehensive assessment before and after the program, and all child and parent/carer workbooks and materials to practice Take Action skills at home are provided. The project has full ethics approval from the Griffith University Human Research Ethics Committee (HREC: 2023/381).
